UPDATE on AFGHANISTAN WITH PARTICULAR FOCUS ON WOMEN'S RIGHTS

In August 2021, the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan (IEA), known as Taliban took control of Afghanistan. This shift in power followed a major escalation in conflict between the Taliban and government of Afghanistan over the course of 2021 and a US Taliban deal resulting in the rapid departure of American troops. The Taliban's control of the country led international donors to immediately suspend most non-humanitarian funding and freeze billions of dollars' worth of assets. Without this funding, most health clinics have closed, and the country is facing total economic meltdown.

The humanitarian crisis is escalating daily. Hunger has reached truly unprecedented levels. Nearly 23 million people i.e., 55% of the population are facing extreme levels of hunger, and 9 million at risk of famine.

"Afghanistan is now among the world's worst humanitarian crises, and food security has all but collapsed. This winter, millions of Afghans will be forced to choose between migration and starvation. We are on a countdown to catastrophe" said the World Food Programme's executive director David Beasley.

remain those of international solidarity, effective action for the individual victim, global coverage, the universality and indivisibility of human rights, impartiality and independence, and democracy and mutual respect

- Taliban deprive women of their livelihood and identity. Afghan women and girls are facing both the collapse of their rights and dreams and risks to their basic survival.
- Taliban have imposed rights-violating policies that have created huge barriers to women and girl's health and education; curtailed freedom of movement, expression and association; and deprived many of earned income.
- According to AI, women have been informed that they cannot go to work or travel without a male guardian. Girls over the age of 12 have been prohibited from attending school, and the segregation of women and men in universities is negatively impacting woman's opportunities in post-secondary institutions. Women have been expelled from many areas of the labour force, including the media and entertainment fields.

A key issue of the campaign is to ensure that the UK government keeps its promise of admitting 20.000 Afghan refugees within five years. This is not sufficient and currently the UK is falling way behind other countries such as Germany and Canada in its rehousing of refugees.

ERITREA PRISONER of CONSCIENCE

ASTER FISSEHATSION, "DISAPPEARED" POLITICIAN

Aster Fissehatsion has been held incommunicado without charge or trial since September 2001. She was arrested together with ten other senior party officials, including her former husband, the then Vice-President of Eritrea, Mahmoud Ahmed Sheriffo. They had all been military or political leaders during the liberation struggle.

Aster and Mahmoud were both members of the People's Front for Democracy and Justice, the only political party in Eritrea, but had become increasingly disillusioned with the autocratic rule of President Isaias Afwerki.

After they, together with13 other senior party officials (the G-15), published an open letter calling for democracy, unity and the rule of law and justice. They were arrested in the middle of the night and have not been heard of since.

Aster's son lives in The Netherlands and has written about witnessing the arrest of his parents.

Aster is a Prisoner of Conscience.
