CRISIS IN UKRAINE (From Amnesty Summer 2022 Issue 213)

Amnesty's findings:

- Russia forces have committed serious violations of international humanitarian and human rights law in Ukraine, including unlawfully killing and injuring civilians, destroying infrastructure, and blocking desperately needed aid.
- Attacks on hospitals and schools, employing "surrender or starve" strategies on civilians, the use of banned weapons such as cluster munitions and strikes on populated areas using inaccurate weapons may constitute war crimes.
- People in besieged cities are on the brink of humanitarian disaster, exposed to constant attacks, their food, and medical supplies dwindling, in many cases deprived of water, electricity and heating.

Amnesty's recommendations:

- The parties to the war must make every effort to spare civilians, prioritise their safe passage out of conflict areas, and allow access to impartial humanitarian relief.
- Both sides must agree on establishing well-planned, safe humanitarian corridors and respect such agreements in good faith.
- Governments across Europe-including in the UK-must put humanity first, ensuring anyone fleeing Ukraine is given protection without discrimination.

Violence against indigenous women and girls

In Canada, First Nations, Métis and Inuit women and girls are at least three times more likely to experience violence and at least six times more likely to be murdered than other woman and girls. Indigenous women's organisations have been sounding the alarm about the violence for decades.

According to a report released by the Royal Mounted Police in May 2015, 1,017 indigenous women and girls went missing or were murdered between 1980 and 2012. Not all cases are reported, so the actual number may be far higher.

In 2019 the Canadian government published the final report of a national inquiry into missing and murdered indigenous women and girls, setting out 231 Calls for Justice to address this violence.

In 2021, the federal government announced work was under way to create a National Action Plan to implement next steps, including support services for survivors and family members, public awareness, and training. However little progress has been made.

APPEAL: Urge the Prime Minister of Canada to ensure the safety of Indigenous women and girls, and to bring those responsible for violence against them to justice. Ask that regular, comprehensive data is recorded on violence against Indigenous women in official crime statistics.
